Anyway, first out was my Carl Goldberg Anniversary Edition J-3 cub covered in Coverite fabric and powered by an OS 70 Four stroke. Had to replace the onboard glow driver plug connector first but then flew it and landed successfully, but I still need a lot of work on take offs!

Next up was my Tower Hobbies \$49 Uproar covered in transparent orange monokote with a Tower Hobbies 40 two stroke. A very good little 40 size airplane, it can be acrobatic but can also fly slow for landing. If you ever build one of these put in a lot of extra doublers where the fat wing goes thru the fuselage. If you don't they tend to break in half under a heavy landing. Just ask Dave Rothbart!

Next a new addition, a Hanger Nine 125 Pulse being pulled around by a DLE 20cc gas engine. Originally this

was a plane that I bought from former member John Muller before he moved to California. It flew very well and I even got some stick time on it before I bought it. I check out all the controls in my shop and brought it out to the field to fly. I crashed very badly in 100 feet because I had the ailerons reversed and didn't check before taking off. I was pretty disappointed in myself and they had discontinued the plane so I couldn't buy any new parts. Ernie Padgette saw how disappointed I was the next day said he had found one on the internet in Long Island. Eventually we bought it after the owner was able to drop it off at his brother in laws convenient store in Philadelphia. He traded it to me for my services building him a Sig Hog Bipe. Long story short, I was able to salvage most of the parts from the first Pulse and reinstalled them in the new one. Had to first re-fiberglass the cowl as it was going from a two stroke to the gas engine. After very carefully checking all the controls Dan Jones helped me successfully re- maiden it at the Culpeper field. It does fly great and I love that sound from the DLE 20 cc gas engine. What's next? Our fall Float Fly is next that's what! September 30th at Lake Ritchie, a great venue and a great picnic lunch available, so get the float planes and boats ready, that's just two weeks away. At the last Float Fly I won a Horizon Hobby Timber electric foam plane and it came with floats. I have flown it with the tundra tires and am looking forward to trying out the floats at Lake Ritchie.

TIPS & TRICKS

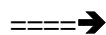

We all tend to pack our receivers in layers of foam and tape. The foam makes it easier to firmly fix the receiver into a secure location within the airframe, and protects the receiver from vibration and shock. Unfortunately, this also makes it difficult to access the receiver, should it be necessary to re-bind the transmitter and receiver. If you simply plug a short servo extension lead into the bind slot of the receiver, and leave it there; and then leave it hanging out of the foam pillow you have fashioned for the receiver; you can simply use the servo extension to re-bind the transmitter and receiver without going to all the trouble of digging out the transmitter and then cutting away all that carefully constructed padding. Just select a servo extension lead long enough to get to without digging into the airframe very far.

I've used 91% rubbing alcohol to clean off fuel residue and oil from my airplanes since I started flying. Well, apparently I'm not the only one who didn't know that some vinyl decals, very expensive and custom made vinyl decals, very expensive and custom made decals which involved a considerable amount of time and effort to obtain, are affected by rubbing alcohol. Affected as in smearing of the color. The color on the vinyl decal of a brand new and very pretty airplane. Aargh!! Don't ask me how I know. Heck, go ahead and ask.
