My 2022 Flying Season (Or, How hard does the wind blow?)

Thus far, the 2022 flying season is off to a roaring start. No, I haven't been flying much. Neither has anyone else as far as I know. The problem is the wind. It's been roaring most of the time. Of course, there have been days when the wind wasn't blowing. Those are the days when it's been cold. Or rainy. Or both. I've heard a lot of comments about how 2022 is probably off to the worst start for many years. Of course, those comments are mostly from those people who said 2021 was bad. And they're probably pretty close to the truth. Well, as Mr. Clemens famously said: "Everyone complains about the weather, but no one ever does anything about it".

This year I have a plan. I had a plan last year. And the year before that. I always seem to have a plan. Usually, several plans. And then there is reality; sometimes referred to as "real life". Which seems to be that I never get as much done as I plan to do. And that's okay. A few of life's lessons I have learned pretty well. One is "I don't have to fly today". That has saved me from trying to fly when the wind sock is fluttering above the horizontal and the pole holding the sock is waving back and forth. And it's probably saved me a few planes. The other is: "This doesn't have to get done today". That has saved me from beating myself up too badly when my plan doesn't go to form.

This year I plan to not buy any more airplanes. I have plenty of airplanes. I have plenty of airplanes I bought, hung up in the basement and forgot about. I can get those planes ready to fly and fly them. I don't need any more airplanes. Thus far, I'm doing pretty well with that plan. I've only bought a few new planes. I have bought an old plane. Maybe two. And a few used planes. One or two kits. Maybe an ARF or two. But only a few actual new planes. The idea is to concentrate of some planes I bought, flew a few times, and put away. I'm going to get those planes up in the air and spend the time necessary to get them flying the way they should fly. You know, get them balanced properly, trimmed exactly, flying well.

Right now, I have several planes I've been working on. I've been enjoying the Extreme Flight Turbo Duster. Gordon did a good job putting that one together for me. The wingspan is 65" and the plane is very light for its size. Add in a 6S 5,000 mAh battery and a motor that will take it straight up until it gets really, really, small and it's a blast to fly. The plane flies well, good flight envelope, both slow and fast. Now I'm trying to get the flaps worked out. The first time I flipped on the take off flaps while flying

along nice and high, not too fast, was interesting. The plane headed up steeply enough I thought for a moment I was going to stall the plane. Maybe mix in some down elevator with the flaps? I did that a few days ago. Now if the wind will just let up a bit.

The Freewing Me-262 is ready to maiden. It's a pretty airplane; 59" wingspan, twin 70mm fans and lots of power. I've trimmed it out as well as I can on the ground. Now I just need to get it into the air. And hopefully, back on the ground in one piece. That will require a day with less than 15 MPH winds, though. And I changed the thrust angles on the 6S Mamba biplane. It's ready to fly as soon as the wind gives me a chance to get it up. Same with the E-flite Phantom F-4. It's ground trimmed, just need to get it in the air for the first time.

I just went on the Motion RC website to see if they have the nose gear parts for the F-18 back in stock. A friend was nice enough to take out the nose gear on takeoff. As soon as I get the new parts in hand I can get it back up. Hey! They have still don't have the nose gear parts I need, but they do have a very nice B2 in stock. 86" wingspan with twin 70mm fans. And that 90mm F-22 really looks nice. Hmmm... Maybe I can fit a couple of new planes into the plan.
